

# Inmates or Formerly Incarcerated People with Disabilities Resources

Roughly 32 percent of inmates in federal prisons and 40 percent in state jails report having at least one disability. An ambulatory disability, defined as serious difficulty walking or climbing stairs, was the second most common disability among both populations.

The challenges of living with physical or mobility impairments while incarcerated are many, from managing chronic secondary conditions to receiving equitable access to onsite spaces. The rights of individuals living with disabilities are protected even during incarceration by the Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA) and Rehabilitation Act of 1973. Federal inmates are entitled to an accessible cell at the appropriate security designation and the opportunity to participate in educational, vocational or religious programs if qualified; inmates may not be placed in medical areas because of a disability unless they are receiving treatment or housed at an inappropriate security level because an accessible cell isn't available. The ADA applies to all federal and state facilities whether they receive federal funding or not.

Resources are available to help individuals navigate health concerns and civil rights issues while serving sentences and upon release. Re-entry services and outreach programs can help formerly incarcerated individuals with disabilities find housing, reapply for government services, and reintegrate into social and work settings.

## Medicare, SSDI During Incarceration and After Release

When sent to prison your Social Security Disability or Retirement benefits are suspended or stopped after 30 days of incarceration. To reinstate benefits you can go to

your local SSA office with "release" paperwork from the DOC. Payment resume about 2 months post release.

\*If you turn 65 while incarcerated you can enroll in Medicare Part A and SSD benefits.
